Dear Bethel,

During my sabbatical in 2023, you, the community of faith that is Bethel blessed me with a period of time away from the routine of ministry for study and renewal. It was a successful sabbatical in many ways. One measure of this is that I'm still being fed by it two years after, even as I ponder what form my next sabbatical may take in three to five years.

When I returned to communities that fostered my sense of call to ordained ministry such as the congregation I grew up in (St. James Lutheran in Rudyard, MI), Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp, and Lutheran Campus Ministry at NMU, I was reading the book *Keeping the Sabbath Wholly* by Marva J. Dawn. It was both an affirming and challenging read. Affirming in that the need for rest, study, and a different routine wasn't a sign of weakness or failing on my part, but how God made all of us as humans.

No matter our vocation, it is important to remember that rest and reflection isn't a luxury, or something to fit into our week 'if we have the time-' rather it is a holy response to the busyness of the world that Dawn refers to as "the tyranny of the urgent."

It was challenging for me to read as I reconnected with places I associated as 'life giving' because I pondered the past leaders (both lay and clergy) whose work I didn't fully appreciate in the moment. There are so many tender moments in being the body of Christ. As we strive to be Christ's voice, hands, and feet in the world, it is easy to grow discouraged, and even easier to pass judgment on one another. In those three months when I wasn't writing a weekly sermon, I did dwell on my own shortcomings in the past...but in a way that allowed for me to better support the work of others going forward.

After all, none of us are perfect...and perhaps that person you want to judge, or came across as rude is going through a difficulty of which we can only guess. Kindness and compassion seem like they are in short supply these days, but I sense that is another mirage the world wants us to see, but isn't real. They exist inside us all, and God is calling for all people to share them freely.

There's a nobility in the human spirit alongside the sin we know all too well. This is why Jesus wants us to tend to our relationships with one another (even enemies!) in the same manner as our relationship with God.

As we begin the busyness of the Fall months, I invite you to not measure your worth in God's eyes on productivity alone. In the waters of Holy Baptism, God proudly claimed the whole of your being. Whether it is in worship, a walk, or work; may you engage your life with kindness toward yourself, an act that naturally extends to others...giving thanks to God for the holiness that equips us daily.

Our Prayer Ministry


"What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear! What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer!"

At a recent reorganizational meeting of the Worship & Music Committee, we began with prayer, giving thanks to God for the privilege of gathering for worship to praise and glorify God and receive God's grace in word and sacrament. We also thanked God for the life and faith of Karen Nichols, for her love of worship and music at Bethel, and her long and dedicated service as the committee chairperson. Among various topics, we discussed the prayer ministry of Bethel congregation as it pertains to worship. A

highlight of our weekly worship service is the Prayer of Intercession in which we pray for the church, the world and all that is in it. We pray for God's intercession in all phases of life. We pray for individuals and groups of people we don't know personally, and we pray for those as close to us as our family members and our church family.
